The Cost of Care segment is an overview of the laws available in the state of Colorado pertaining to animals with a focus on 18-9-202.5, Cost of Care procedures.

- Overview and discussion of Colorado laws that can be seen as resources for a multi-agency approach or to restart a stalled investigation
- Review of the Animal Welfare Act of 1970, §2131 and §2156(c)
- Comprehensive review of CRS 18-9-202.5 with case reviews and defense strategies used to delay cases

COURSE INSTRUCTORS:

Rebeca Farris is one of three animal control officers with the Weld County Sheriff's Office in Colorado and has held the position for 17 years. During that time she has, investigated numerous cruelty and neglect cases and assisted in the prosecution. In 2010, Rebeca became a Field Training Officer for new animal control officers. As the senior ACO, Rebeca is a co-coordinator of the Weld/Northeast Region County Animal Response Team, covering not only Weld County, but also ten other counties in northeastern Colorado, a position she has held since 2010. In 2013, Rebeca became a Field Evidence Technician (FET) with the Sheriff's Office and has photographed and collected evidence at many crime scenes, varying from animal cruelty to vehicle theft to homicide.

Bret Smith serves as a Field Investigator for the Colorado Humane Society & SPCA. Bret supports the Southeast region of Colorado for the Colorado Humane Society's investigative operations and is a commissioned agent by the Colorado Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Animal Protection. Bret has more than 28 years of experience with animal welfare, control and investigations, which include eight years with Pueblo Animal Services and over seven years with Colorado Humane Society. Bret is a fourth generation Coloradoan with a background in ranching, cattle feed yards, guest ranches and has traveled over 7,000 miles on horseback from Southern Arizona to Montana and back twice while with a wagon train serving troubled youth. Bret is considered an expert in animal investigations in several county courts of Colorado.

Brett Boeh serves as Field Investigator for the Colorado Humane Society & SPCA and is a commissioned agent by the Colorado Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Animal Protection. Mr. Boeh has served more than 20 years in various roles at the Dumb Friends League including Senior Kennel Technician and Animal Cruelty Investigator. Additionally, he was Executive Director for the Humane Society of Sarasota County Florida, Animal Control Supervisor for the Santa Fe County Sheriff's Department, Animal Control Division, in Santa Fe, NM, and Customer Service Supervisor for the Marin Humane Society in California.
